NARRATIVE DESCRIPTION

The Hinds County Armory, located at 1012 Mississippi Street on the Mississippi State Fairgrounds, in Jackson, has statewide significance under Criterion C as an excellent and rare example of Gothic Revival architecture of the 1920's, and under Criterion A for its historic association with the mobilization of United States armed forces during World War II.

The Armory is a large, brick structure resting on a brick foundation with a steel-framed arched roof over the drill hall. The Armory is two stories in height with a centrally located, hipped-roof tower on the south façade. A limestone water table surrounds the entire building.

The building was designed in the Gothic Revival style by Frank P. Gates, and evokes the sense of a medieval castle. To that end, there are pyramidal pinnacles with metal finials atop every corner of the building, as well as at the corners of the tower and over the secondary entrance. There is a metal finial perched atop the pyramidal roof of the main tower. There is intermittent coping recalling a crenellated parapet.

The windows on the Armory are steel-framed awnings. The water table acts as the sill on the first story, while the second story has brick sills. On the east and west elevation, there are brick pilasters between every window.

The entrance is located on the south façade in the base of tower. The entry is located within a Gothic arch, and has been infilled with brick and two smaller modern doors. Directly above the doors are tripartite Gothic arch windows. There is a secondary entrance on the east elevation, which retains its original double-leaf wooden doors.

The interior of the building, while utilitarian in design, possesses a great deal of integrity to its original use as an armory. The drill hall is centrally located in the building. It is two stories in height with bleachers lining the east, south and west sides. The stage is located on the north end of the drill hall with a very simple surround. It is flanked on either side by Gothic doorways. There is a partial second floor across the rear of the building, behind the stage. The rest of the building is used for storage and classroom space.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Hinds County Armory, located at 1012 Mississippi Street in Jackson, has statewide significance under Criterion C as an excellent and rare example of Gothic Revival architecture of the 1920s.

The armory was built in 1927 by Hinds County, who made it available for use by the Mississippi National Guard. The National Guard used the building for 50 years, until it was closed in 1979. The architect for the armory was Frank P. Gates, who practiced in Jackson in the late 1920s and early 1930s. He was also responsible for the design of the Tunica County Courthouse, built in 1922, and the Masonic Building in Tutwiler, Tallahatchie County, built in 1926.

The armory appears to have been one of only a few buildings in the state to be built as armories in the early part of the 20th century, and it is the oldest 20th century armory known to survive. It is one of the relatively few buildings that still survive in the state that are related to military training and preparedness between World War I and World War II, and of those, it is evidently one of the oldest (since other surviving examples – such as the armories in Meadville and Aberdeen, and building 1071 at Camp Shelby – were built in the late 1930s). Perhaps the greatest historical importance of all these buildings is that they represent Mississippi's contribution to the mobilization for World War II.

Some of the National Guard units using the Hinds County Armory in 1940, on the eve of mobilization for World War II were: Headquarters, 106th Engineer Regiment; Company A, 106th Engineers; Company B, 155th Infantry; Company C, 155th Infantry; Medical Detachment, 106th Engineers; and Medical Detachment, 155th Infantry. The 106th Engineer Regiment was inducted into federal service on November 25, 1940, for service in World War II. The 155th Infantry Regiment entered federal service about the same time.¹

Architecturally, the building is a rare secular example of Gothic Revival architecture of the 1920s. During this period, the Gothic Style was quite popular for churches, and was occasionally used for schools –although Tudor and Jacobean architecture was more fashionable for that purpose – but its use for other types of buildings was quite unusual. In this case, the intent appears to have been to evoke a romantic martial atmosphere suggestive of a medieval castle, or perhaps a sense of the great military institutions such as West Point and Virginia Military Institute.


The boundaries include only the area immediately surrounding the Armory. There have been many additions to the surrounding State Fairgrounds that are not historically associated with the Armory.
