Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The primary reason for the nomination of the Mayersville Archaeological Site to the National Register is the site's potential for <u>contributing</u> useful information toward a reconstruction of the cultural sequence

Mayersville phase, and the site and material from its surface were the basis for the definition of that phase. The site is significant in that it may yield an understanding of the culture, history, and settlement, and socio-economic organization of the region from A.D. 1200 to 1400. Phillip Phillips (1970:13) has argued that the Mayersville phase "may be the climax phase of the whole Yazoo sequence in a general development sense."
