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DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The United States Post Office in Amory is located approximately two blocks northeast of Hwv. 25 as it bisects the central business district. It is Colonial Revival in style. A brick basement level rises above grade to a double-course. limestone water table. The elevated main floor is made accessible by a flight of granite steps with cast iron railings that terminate at the sidewalk with a pair of prominent lanterns. The exterior walls consist of one full story crowned by a wooden frieze and cornice highlighted by a dentil molding. The roof over the public lobby is transverse gable covered in slate shingles. A square, wooden, flat-roofed cupola with louvered lights for ventilation is located on the roof ridge over the central bay. The gable ends show small fanlights. The roof over the working area is the flat, built-up type with a brick parapet wall above. capped by a limestone coping. The street facade is divided into five bays reading window-window-door-window-window. The outer two windows and the middle three bays together are each contained in slightly recessed panels (or pilasters. the relationship is ambiguous). Windows in the front facade are wooden, double hung sash (twelve over twelve) and have limestone lintels and sills. The central doorway is articulated by classical wooden detailing including a flanking pair of fluted, half-round Doric colonnettes, an entablature with a dentil molding, and a projecting cornice. A semicircular recessed panel appears above the transom with a brick voissoir surround. Centered in this space is a high relief cast stone eagle approximately two feet high. The west facade consists of five bays with two setbacks occurring behind the public lobby area. The east facade consists of four bays with only a slight setback behind the lobby. A loading platform projects from the center of the north facade. A full basement level exists here. Brick masonry in the English bond is used throughout. plan (see enclosed plan drawing) consists of a rectangular public lobby immediately north of the central entrance, with the postmaster's office on the south-The remaining area is given over to a large workroom and adjacent mailing vestibule which opens onto the loading platform. A small mezzanine level consisting of a swing room and lookout is located above and behind the The lobby itself contains a polychrome terrazzo floor and tile Some original woodwork remains, although the screenline has been wainscoting. substantially altered and the wooden vestibule replaced by an aluminum one.

A mural by John McCrady, created under the Treasury Bureau's Section of Fine Arts program, was completed and installed in the lobby in 1939 at a cost of \$560. The work, which depicts town life in Amory circa 1889, is presently in a good state of preservation. (See attached Fine Arts Inventory form).

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STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE Politics/Government

The first Public Buildings Act of 1913 and the second Public Building Act of 1926 were supplemented in 1933 by Congress, on the urging of Franklin Delano Roosevelt, with the Federal Emergency Administration of Public Works. Between 1933 and 1941 a tremendous amount of construction resulted in the United States, including four post offices in Mississippi constructed under the 1926 Act and thirty-two post offices in Mississippi constructed under 1933 PWA legislation.

The U.S. Post Office in Amory, Mississippi, built in 1939, is significant as one of the thirty-two post offices constructed in the state with Public Works Administration funds during the Great Depression. (See also "Federal Construction Work 1913-1941").

Architecture

This Post Office and the City Hall represent the two most important governmental public buildings within the community. Of the thirty-six post offices within this thematic nomination, all but five of them were designed in the Colonial Revival Style or at least show influences of this style; the Amory structure recalls the Georgian Style and as such represents a fine example of this idiom. The most significant details are the cupola, the fanlights in the gables, and the frontispiece with eagle motif.

Art

The Department of the Treasury's Section of Fine Arts Program was begun by Franklin Delano Roosevelt, and in two phases, the Public Works of Art Project and the Section of Painting and Sculpture, several thousand artists produced multiple thousand pieces of art throughout the United States, including sculpture and mural paintings.

The building is significant because of the beautiful mural in the lobby above the postmaster's office. The mural was completed in 1939 and it is entitled "Amory, Mississippi...1889". The mural is appropriate to the community because it depicts the town's main street in 1889. The work was done by John McCrady who was born in Oxford, Mississippi.
