#### Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Hewes Building, constructed 1903-04, is a four-by-seven-bay, five-story brick commercial structure. Its facade is designed in the Second Renaissance Revival Style employing moulded stone lintels with pronounced keys and end voussoirs, a heavy dentiled and modillioned cornice, and moulded stone copings and rusticated quoins.

The original first story is delineated from the upper floors by a moulded stone belt course and is divided horizontally by a canopy. Below the canopy is an irregularly fenestrated, completely modernized, variegated brick storefront. Above the canopy are two sets of original quadripartite clerestory windows with radiating stone voussoirs. The windows of the second through fifth floors consist of two-over-two, flat-headed, double-hung sash.

The ground floor lobby retains its original pressed-metal ceiling and contains the entrance to the stairway and elevator. Also on the ground floor was retail store space which is thought to have originally housed a single dry goods store. This area was later divided into two spaces.

Within the building an open elevator shaft is surrounded by a wooden stairway with continuous ramped rails and simple metal ballasters. Moderately ornate elevator shaft grills at all floor levels give this area of the building an open, ornamental, yet functional, appearance. An original ornate steel cage elevator remains and is thought to be the only one of its kind remaining and operating in Mississippi.

The floor plan of the second through fifth floors consists of a central corridor with rooms on each side. The interior construction is largely intact and consists of plaster walls, ornate wood mouldings, and transom windows above the doors.

### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

A significant regional landmark, the Hewes Building illustrates the remarkably rapid development of the last city established along the Mississippi Gulf Coast. Chartered in 1898, Gulfport's origins can be traced to the economic boom that occurred in the South between the 1880s and World War I, an event made manifest in south Mississippi in the exploitation of the region's extensive timber resources. One notable by-product of the boom was the Hewes Building, constructed 1903-04, reflecting the business prospects recognized by Gulfport's developers. This, the tallest and least altered of Gulfport's original commercial structures, is a good example of the continuing use of traditional architectural styles in a multistory building. Its symmetry and simplicity make it a handsome turn-of-thecentury building and an important element in preserving the early architectural character of Gulfport's central business district.


