DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Big Black River Battlefield and affiliated fortifications and campsites encompass an area of approximately two square miles of land south of the old U. S. Highway 80, as well as 1/4 square mile north of this same highway, where U. S. Highway 80 crosses the Big Black River, in Hinds County.

The Union fortifications are situated on the bluffs on Clear Creek. Located on the south bank, they continue in a semi-circle west to east to south and terminate at the Big Black River railroad bridge in sections 21 and 22.

Union and Confederate campsites are bordered by Clear Creek on the north, Bovina on the west, the Big Black River on the east, and extend 1/2 mile south of old U. S. Highway 80.

The battlefield is under cultivation as it was at the time of the battle.

The fortifications and campsites are on cleared residential, pasture and wooded areas as when constructed in 1863.

Some remains of the Confederate defenses and Union fortifications are presently distinguishable today.

The wreckage of the CSS Charm and CSS Paul Jones can be seen when the Big Black is at low stage.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Big Black River Bridge Battle was fought May 17, 1863, in an area where the river forms a horseshoe bend; it was in this region that the Confederates had constructed rifle pits as defenses after withdrawing from the Battle of Champion Hill 9.8 miles to the east. These defenses were on the east bank of the river and protected the approach to the bridge. The defenses along with the natural terrain of the area provided excellent cover for the brigades of Generals John C. Vaughn and Martin Green.

About 10:00 a.m. the Union forces of Brigadier General Eugene A. Carr under the command of General John A. McClearnand, engaged the Confederate pickets in the woods at Smith's Station, about 2 miles east of the bridge. After driving in the pickets, the Union forces were confronted with the Confederate troops, well-entrenched, but demoralized from the defeat of Champion Hill the day before. The bombardment from Battery A of the 2nd. Illinois Light Artillery and the 1st. Battery of the Indiana Light Artillery followed by a lightning charge of the 2nd. Brigade under Brigadier General Michael K. Lawler rolled up the left wing of the Confederate defenses. The Union forces then advanced to the bridge with little trouble, capturing vast numbers of prisoners, small arms and 18 field guns.

The steamers, CSS Dot, CSS Paul Jones, and CSS Charm were at the Big Black Bridge Landing, seeking safety from Union fleets operating on the Mississippi. The Confederates had placed these vessels parallel to the bridge. After crossing in retreat, the Confederates burned the steamers and bridge to hinder the advance by Union forces.

Union forces occupied these positions through the siege of Vicksburg until August, 1864.

Earthworks were constructed on the bluffs of the south bank of Clear Creek, extending to and along the west bank of Big Black River.

Union camp sites were located directly west along Clear Creek and south between Warrior's Trail Road and the west bank of the Big Black River.

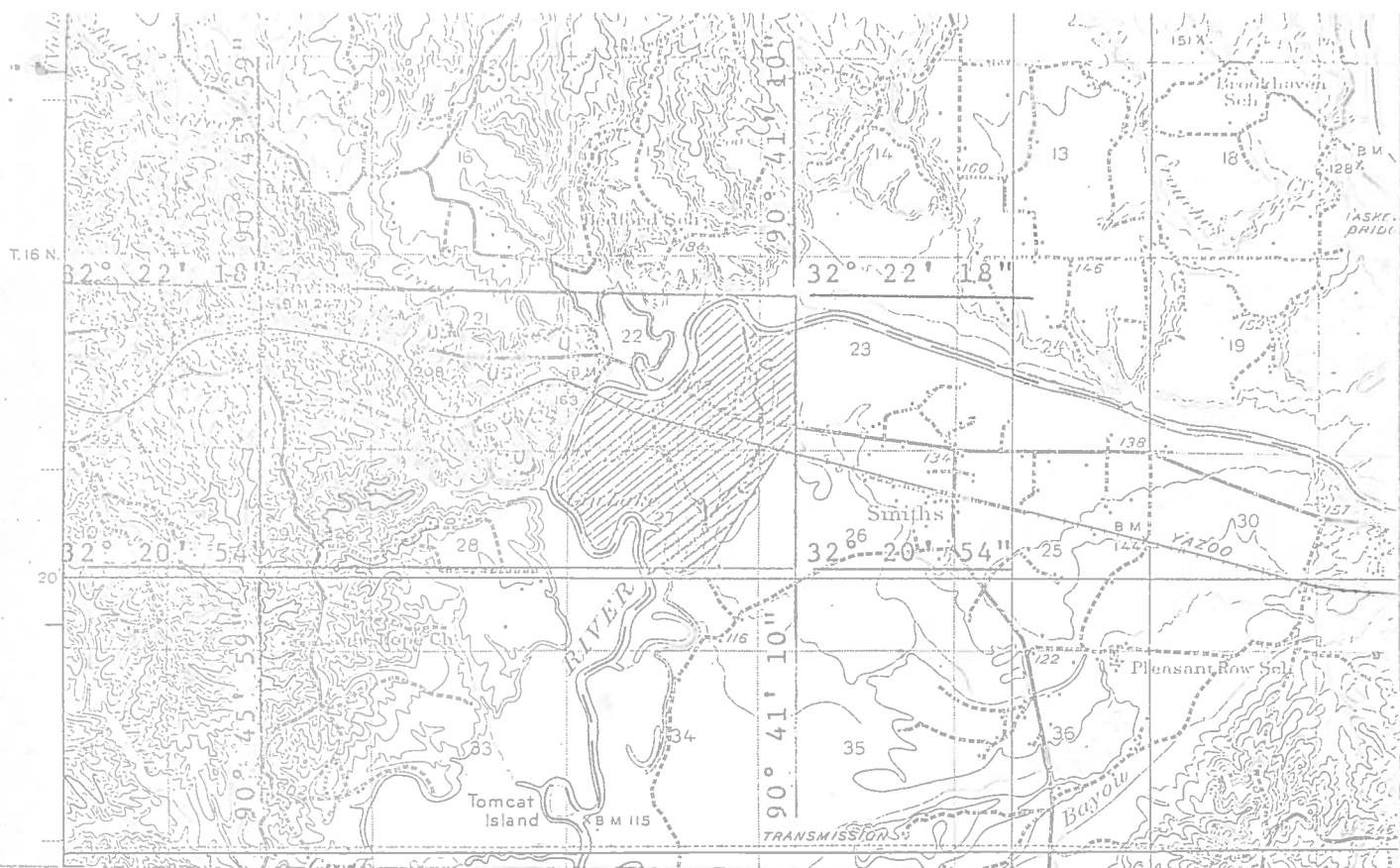

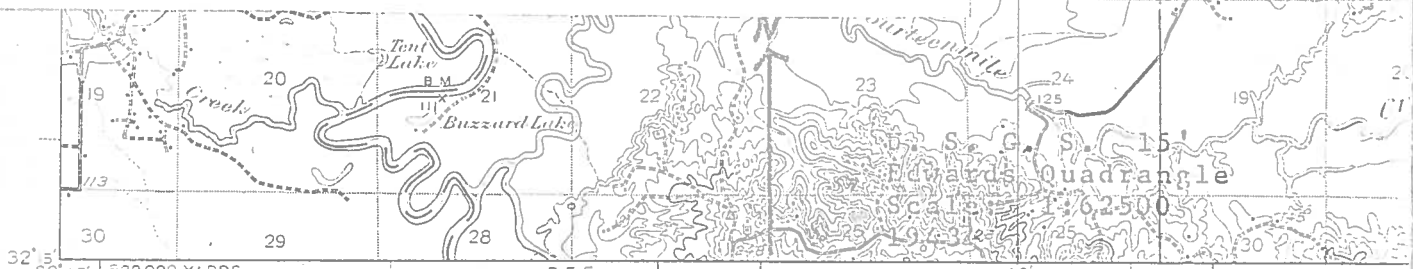
