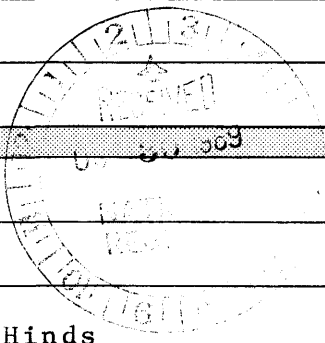

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Governor's Mansion, Greek Revival in style, stands impressively in downtown Jackson. Of masonry construction, the building is two stories above a full basement. Its brick and stone exterior is broken by large rectangular windows. The mansion's impressiveness is attained through use of a square massive form adorned by a front portico of the Corinthian order. The portico is two-storied and semi-circular in design with four fluted columns. It reflects the plan of the original architect, William Nichols, when he reported to the chairman of the joint committee of the Mississippi Legislature on public buildings, February 12, 1840, that he "intended to avoid a profusion of ornament, and to adhere to a plain republican simplicity...."

Above the entrance doorway is an iron-railed balcony, fronting a doorway with transom and sidelights similar to the one below. On the east side are a porte-cochere and entrance which were added during the renovations of 1908-09. A two storied addition was annexed to the rear of the mansion at this time to provide additional living quarters for the governor and his family, and the outer walls were covered with yellow pressed brick.

The front or original portion of the building contains spacious drawing rooms and reception halls. The cornices, medallions, woodwork, and other interior details are particularly fine. The original stairway was retained during the 1908-09 renovations. The inside balcony was added in 1908 when the annex and east porte-cochere were attached to the original structure.

The yellow brick was first painted white during the administration of Governor Paul B. Johnson, 1940-43. The mansion underwent major structural renovation in 1961; however, the original beauty and design were preserved.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Construction of the Governor's Mansion began in 1839. The architect for the building was William Nichols, who also designed Mississippi's historic Old Capitol and the Lyceum Building at the University of Mississippi, as well as an early state capitol at Tuscaloosa, Alabama. Nichols was a native of Bath, England.

A splendid example of Greek Revival architecture, the mansion was completed late in the year 1841 and was first occupied in 1842 by Governor Tilghman M. Tucker. Since that time, it has served continuously as the home of the governors of the State of Mississippi. In addition to the list of distinguished occupants, several notable American personalities, including Henry Clay, Vice President Richard M. Johnson (purported slayer of Tecumseh), William Jennings Bryan, President William Howard Taft, Theodore Roosevelt, Will Rogers, Douglas MacArthur, and John F. Kennedy have been guests at the Governor's Mansion. Louis Kossuth, the Hungarian patriot, visited the mansion in 1852, as did Princess Juliana and Prince Bernhard of the Netherlands during World War II.

The Governor's Mansion was briefly occupied by General William T. Sherman, following the successful Federal siege of Jackson in July, 1863. One of the more dramatic events to occur during the history of the Governor's Mansion was the forcible removal of Governor Benjamin G. Humphreys and his family by Federal troops in 1868.

Among the prominent Mississippians who have visited the Governor's Mansion are Jefferson Davis, Mrs. Jefferson Davis, Miss Varina Anne "Winnie" Davis, J. Z. George, L. Q. C. Lamar, John Sharp Williams and Pat Harrison.

In 1904, there was talk of disposing of the building when it was in bad repair, was expensive to maintain, and occupied a block of valuable real estate. Public opinion rallied to support the preservation of the mansion, and the Mississippi Legislature authorized renovations which were accomplished in 1908-09. William S. Hull was the architect for the renovations.

In 1973, the 1908 annex was removed; its replacement is steel-framed and will provide modern living quarters for the Governor's family. The interior of the original portion of the building was completely dismantled for restoration.

The front or original portion of the building contains spacious drawing rooms and reception halls. The cornices, medallions, woodwork, and other interior details are particularly fine. Greek Revival doorways duplicate designs of Minard Lafever in Beauties of Modern Architecture (1835).

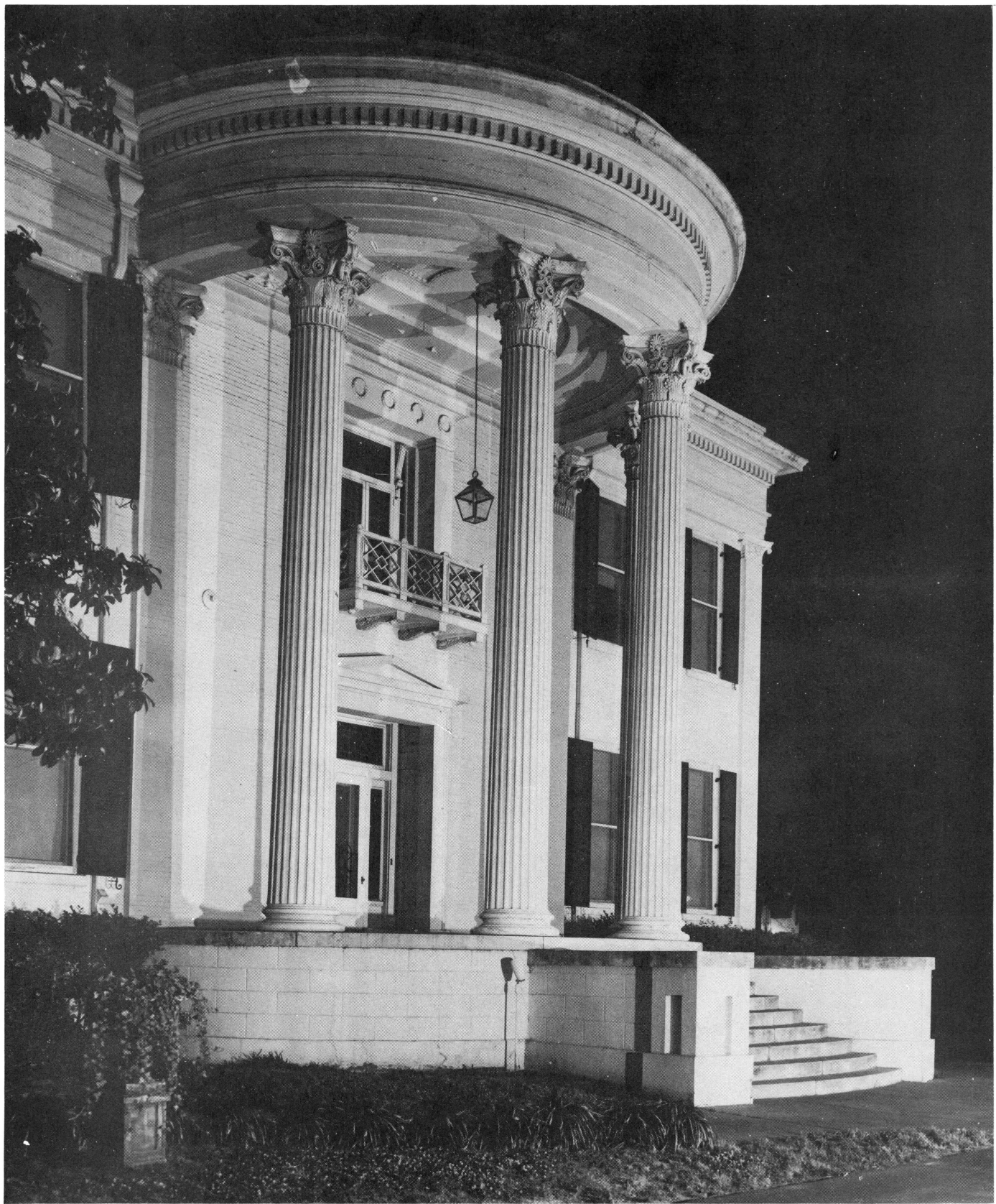
