DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The United States Marine Hospital dominates a prominent hilltop site on the bluffs of the Mississippi River in Natchez, Mississippi. Culminating the sweeping vista from the city and national cemeteries located to the north, the hospital is laid out on a southwest/northeast axis to maximize the view of the river.

Monumental in its massing and its Spartan use of simple, geometric detailing, the three-and-one-half story, H-shaped, hip-roofed, brick structure with projecting corner pavilions is set on a high basement. Placed between the end pavilions on the northwest and southeast facades, creating a dramatic play of solid against void, are inset galleries with giant-order, square brick columns with sandstone bases and capitals (now painted) on elongated, story-high, pedestal-like piers. The piers are repeated on the ground level of the northeastern facade where the sloped site permits direct access to the ground floor. The principal floors of the galleries are enclosed by a handsome, cast-iron, filigree-pattern balustrade. A stylized architrave and frieze are set under the continuous, overhanging boxed eaves detailed to suggest a modillioned cornice. Each central bay of the principal elevations was originally set with a simple frontispiece surrounding a single-leaf, four-panel door and transom. Most have been replaced by modern fire doors, and the ground level of the galleries has been enclosed. Six-over-six sash windows are used throughout. The shallow hipped roof, now pierced by large, early-twentieth-century, gabled dormers that illuminate the fourth-level chambers, is crowned by a central, frame, octagonal belvedere glazed with double-hung sash.

Although the hospital has been extensively altered and modernized during the present century, much of the floor plan and some of the original fabric of the interior survive, including the impressive and graceful central staircase that rises from the first floor to the belvedere. The continuous cherry handrail is carried on slender, turned balusters. Originally detailed with simple Grecian-style woodwork, the small chambers in the southwestern corner pavilion are the least altered, retaining stepped baseboards as well as the eared mantels and architraves

surrounding four-panel doors.

A boxy, three-bay-by-six-bay, two-story, hip-roofed brick nursing school in the turn-of-the-century Colonial Revival style was built at the southeastern corner of the hospital about 1903. Now connected to the hospital by a one-story brick hyphen, the structure originally had a single-bay Ionic portico on the southwestern facade that has been replaced by a full-facade, double-tiered enclosed and screened porch.

## STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The United States Marine Hospital in Natchez, Mississippi, is a well-preserved and significant example of nineteenth-century institutional architecture that continues to serve its original function as a hospital. The building is a noteworthy expression of the monumental Greek Revival idiom applied to a public building.

One of seven hospitals authorized by Congress in 1837 to be built in ports along the Mississippi and Ohio Rivers, the U.S. Marine Hospital in Natchez was constructed between 1849 and 1852, under the supervision of the noted explorer Stephen Harriman Long and his assistant Charles A. Fuller (U.S. ... Auditor). Long (1784-1864), a career army officer and engineer, explored and mapped vast regions of the Rocky Mountains and of the upper Mississippi and Platte Rivers before the mid-1820s (Malone p. 380). He also supervised the 1847-1851 construction of a marine hospital in Louisville, Kentucky--still standing but unused--that was nearly identical to the Natchez hospital (Jones, Kentucky Historical Commission). Robert Mills, in his capacity as United States Architect of Public Works from 1835 until his death in 1855, may have designed the prototype for marine hospitals, but there is apparently no record to indicate that he designed the facility in Natchez. Construction and operation of marine hospitals was partially funded by a mandatory monthly deduction of a few cents from the pay of all seamen (Louisville [Kentucky] Courier-Journal, February 5, 1888).

The Natchez facility functioned as a 100-bed-capacity marine hospital until the outbreak of the Civil War. After the fall of Vicksburg in 1863, it was surrounded by a five-sided earthwork as part of Fort McPherson and served as a hospital and administration building for the occupying Union Army. In 1876 the then-vacant structure was sold with congressional approval to the American Baptist Home Mission Society (Deed Book VV:304-308), which used it as a theological seminary for training

black ministers.

The City of Natchez purchased the property in 1884 to replace the dilapidated facility that had housed the Natchez Hospital since 1813. The name was changed to Natchez Charity Hospital about 1920, and the facility continues to serve as a hospital under the auspices of the Board of Trustees of State Eleemosynary Institutions.

A two-story brick building adjoining the main structure on the southeast was erected about 1903 to accommodate the school of nursing begun in 1901 and now serves as the physicians' quarters.

Government regulations for upgrading the facility to present-day standards pose the most serious threat to the preservation of the building.






