ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION:

Measuring 300' in length, the twin-tower swinging suspension bridge has a central span of 200' and two 50' spans between the towers and the North Fork Coles Creek bank. Iron-sheathed concrete towers support the 25-foot wide wooden deck, which consists of creosoted float beams, stringers, and decking.

The Coon Box Fork Bridge was constructed in 1919 at a cost of \$3,498.99 and repaired in 1927 by W.H. Groome and Son at a cost of \$1,058.38. The bridge incorporates the Schuster and Jacob cable anchoring system design (patent #s 6203,729591; dated June 2, 1903).

None (routine maintenance consists of replacement of the wood deck approximately every fifteen years).

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE:

The Coon Box Fork Bridge is a highly successful technological product of the early twentieth century that met rural transportation needs in southwestern Mississippi. Easier to maintain than wooden bridges and less expensive than iron bridges, swinging suspension bridges similar to the Coon Box Fork Bridge proliferated in Jefferson County after 1900. The patented Schuster and Jacob anchoring system allowed for a simple yet secure method for anchoring bridge cables in the ground. The substitution of concrete infill in ^{the} cable anchoring system by W.H.Groome and Son was hastened after the frequent deterioration of the wood infill used according to the Schuster and Jacob patent. The Schuster and Jacob bridge design was used by local contractors in Jefferson county such as Robert Taylor, J.K. Gallbreath and W.H. Groome and Son. Although originally constructed by Robert Taylor in 1919, the repair of the Coon Box Fork bridge in 1927

by Groome incorporated the improved anchoring system. All of the bridges constructed in Jefferson county were financed by bonds issued by the county. The Coon Box Fork Bridge served the agricultural transportation needs of local farmers in nearby Coon Box, a settlement situated approximately one mile northeast of the bridge.
