DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Snowdoun is a two-story wood frame residence situated on the corner of Third Avenue North and Ninth Street, near the Columbus, Mississippi, central business district. Extant and original landscape features include bricked walks, ovalshaped parterres, and a shaded circular walk in the front of the property. The house features a diagonal Greek cross plan with four projecting pavilions and central octagonal core. During the 1870s the flat roof and octagonal cupola were replaced with a steep-pitched gabled roof. The two-story rear (southeast) portico was partially enclosed ca. 1917, bathrooms installed, and a pedimented one-story kitchen added on the south side of the portico. The building is supported by a brick-pier foundation, with a basement service washroom on the southeast side.

Rising in the center of the front (northwest) elevation is a striking twostory, three-sided portico with four fluted octagonal columns supporting the entablature. A dormer window with broken pediment and dentiled cornice extends from the gabled roof and overlooks the portico, flanked on both sides by corbelled cap chimneys, which date from the 1870s renovation. The four second-story gable ends are trimmed in the same fashion as the dormer window, with pointed-arch openings centered in the tympanum, and bargeboard decoration and pendant at the top of the gable.

The fenestration of the northwest facade is particularly fine, with bracketed cornices over the jib windows on both floors. Frontispiece entrances on the first floor and balcony have diamond-patterned Venetian glass in the side lights and transom. A three-sided second-story balcony is located above the portico veranda, with an ornamental jigsaw design balustrade.

The southeast elevation reflects the changing life-style of Snowdoun's residents. A one-story kitchen was added on the south side of the rear portico ca. 1917, replacing the original kitchen and slaves' quarters--a one-story brick structure adjacent to the new kitchen addition and formerly joined to the main house by a brick walk and latticed passageway. Traces of the brick walk remain. The 1871 <u>Bird's Eye View of Columbus</u>, <u>Mississippi</u> depicts Snowdoun as an estate occupying an entire block, with kitchen, slaves' quarters, and four other outbuildings, including a dairy and stables.

The interior of Snowdoun features an octagonal hall with a spiral staircase and four, four-paneled doors with eared architrave trim leading to the library, bedroom, rear veranda, and dining room and drawing room. Triangular closets are employed to square off each room. Wooden cornices above the windows are used throughout the house, varied in form and in graining or gilding technique. The second-floor plan of the main house is identical to the first, with the spiral stair continuing up to the attic.

The dining room is of particular interest, containing the Billups family collection of rare china, silver, and glass, including syllabub cups, satin and Bristol glass bowls, and a tall epergne with the initials "S.G.B.," for Major Billups' wife, Sally Govan Billups. The mahogany-stained window cornices are particularly handsome, with milled scrollwork and turned finial. The chandelier, like the others in the house, was originally a gas fixture, and has etched glass shades with crystal prisms.

#### STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The use of the octagonal theme with the cross axial plan has produced in Snowdoun a highly successful and individualistic form of residential architecture for the Columbus region. Built in 1854, its architectural integrity is largely intact, despite the major exterior roofline alterations that occurred roughly twenty years after the house was built. Visited by persons important in the history of the South, Snowdoun remains a symbol of the lavish hospitality of wealthy property owners during the antebellum period in Columbus and Mississippi.

A prototypical "Anglo-Grecian Villa," as popularized by William H. Ranlett in <u>The Architect</u>, published in 1847, Snowdoun is similar in design and plan to Cooleemee Plantation (built in 1853-1855 by Peter W. Hairston in Davis County, North Carolina), with the diagonal Greek cross plan, projecting pavilions, and octagonal center hall. These features are paralleled at Snowdoun with the addition of Greek Revival stylistic elements to the country villa form and plan, most visibly expressed in the structure's facade portico.

Constructed by Governor James Whitfield, Snowdoun was purchased in 1866 by Confederate Major John Marshall Billups, president of the Columbus Insurance and Banking Company (now the First Columbus National Bank), plantation owner, and cotton merchant. The property has remained in the Billups family and is now owned by Mrs. Thompson Daniel, granddaughter of Major Billups. The name Snowdoun is derived from the Billups family estate in Scotland. Several prominent nineteenth-century military and political figures visited the house and have spoken from the balcony, including Jefferson Davis during his campaign for the United States Senate, Confederate General Nathan Bedford Forrest, and U.S. Supreme Court Justice L. Q. C. Lamar.

The house contains a variety of documents and memorabilia relating to the history of the Billups family, Snowdoun, and the South, including a Mexican War battle flag, letters from Jefferson Davis and Robert E. Lee, and Henry Clay's calling card.

The preservation of these and other objects of historical significance, coupled with the continuous ownership of the property by the Billups family, has preserved the outstanding mid-nineteenth-century ambience of the property.


