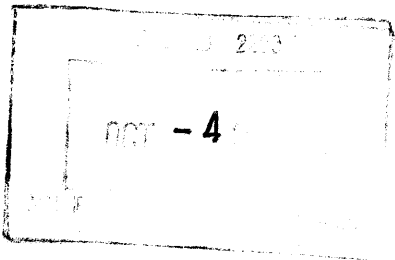

Narrative Description

Completed in 1898, the Corinth Clothing Manufacturing Company Building (later known as the Adams Machinery Company Building, the Berry Motors Building, and the Chadco Building) is a two-story, gabled-roofed industrial building of brick construction. As originally built, the structure was a long rectangular building, 200 feet by 48 feet, oriented roughly northwest to southeast. By 1904 a two-story brick wing had been added to the center of the southwest side of the building, creating a T-shaped structure. Further additions were later made to the southwest side of the building, resulting in its present roughly L-shaped plan. The exterior walls of the original building are articulated by shallow brick pilasters between each pair of windows on the side walls and flanking the centered entrance at the northwest end.

The five-bay front façade, on the northwest end of the building, has a central entrance that retains its original four-light transom, but the doors are replacements. Most of the building's original 6-over-6 windows had been removed, but the building has recently undergone an extensive restoration, and the windows have been accurately replicated throughout the building.

The interior of the building contains offices in the front portion and open industrial areas throughout the rest of the building. The offices retain many historic features such as original doors, some original horizontal board walls, and the original main staircase. Two walk-in safes – one on each floor – remain in the building, as does the hydraulic freight elevator. The first floor of the industrial area has a concrete floor and unfinished ceilings, while the second floor has a wooden floor and unfinished ceilings.

Statement of Significance

Constructed in 1897-98, the Corinth Clothing Manufacturing Company Building (later known as the Adams Machinery Company Building, the Berry Motors Building, and the Chadco Building), is architecturally significant as one of Mississippi's few industrial or mill buildings surviving from before about 1905. These buildings were typically long, fairly narrow brick buildings of two or three stories. The oldest documented building of the type in the state is the Corinth Machinery Building, built in 1869. The form was most widely used from the 1880s into the first few years of the twentieth century, and the Corinth Clothing Manufacturing Company Building, despite some changes, is a good example of this increasingly rare building type. Other surviving examples in Mississippi include the Irwin Manufacturing Company Building in New Albany, the Tupelo Cotton Mill (1901), the J.M. Stone Cotton Mill in Starkville (1902), and the Stonewall Cotton Mills (1880s-1895). The latter three are listed on the National Register. Non-extant examples include the Tombigbee Cotton Mill in Columbus, the Laurel Cotton Mill, the Rosalie and Natchez Cotton Mills in Natchez, and the Mississippi Mills in Wesson.¹

The existing turn-of-the century industrial buildings are historically significant because they represent the efforts to develop industry in Mississippi from the late 19th century into the first decade of the twentieth century. Although the Corinth Clothing Manufacturing Company Building has undergone alterations over the years – mainly the removal of most of its original windows and several additions – it retains sufficient integrity to be individually eligible for listing in the National Register under Criterion C in the area of Architecture as a rare surviving example of a factory building from this period. In addition, the building is important as the location, in later years, of the Berry Motors Company, where Frank Berry, Sr. (1904-1969) developed the Berry Drive, which powered saw mills worldwide, and rotary hydraulic air motors, valves, and pumps, including the application of providing hydraulics to power elevators.
