Describe present and historic physical appearance.

The Blum House is situated, facing east, on the northwest corner of South and Cherry Streets in Vicksburg, Mississippi. The two-story, clapboard, Neoclassical Revival house is topped with a slate-covered, truncated hipped roof surmounted by a balustraded platform and four tall, corbelled, interior chimneys. The two-story portico has an oval window in the tympanum and is supported by four slender two-story Ionic columns. The cornice is enhanced by modillions. A narrow balcony enclosed by a spindle balustrade and supported by heavy brackets projects from the second floor under the portico. Four two-story, Ionic pilasters are evenly spaced across the main facade. There are three bays on the main elevation: double-leaf leaded doors with leaded sidelights and transom flanked by a one-over-one, double-hung window on either side. The bays on the second floor mirror those on the first floor.

The south facade is dominated toward the front by a two-story semicircular bay with two one-over-one, double-hung windows on the first story and two twelve-over-one, double-hung windows on the second story, and toward the rear of the residence by a five-sided, one-story bay topped with a balustrade and pierced by six one-over-one, double-hung windows. Piercing the roof on this facade are two slender gabled dormers with round-arched, double-hung windows flanked by pilasters supporting the returns of the gable end.

The corners of the house on the rear elevation reveal two-story pilasters that turn the corners. Also on the rear elevation is a two-tiered gallery rounded on the south end and covered by a flat roof. The porch is supported by square columns and is completed with a spindle balustrade on each tier. A dormer like those on the side elevation is also found on the rear elevation. Window openings of all elevations but the main facade are filled with one-over-one, double-hung sash on the lower level and twelve-over-one, double-hung sash on the second level.

The house sits on a raised limestone foundation. The interior retains its original woodwork, mantels, and many original light fixtures. (It is the policy of the Mississippi Department of Archives and History not to require interior documentation of properties included as part of multiple property submissions.)

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

The Blum House derives its significance from its architectural character (criterion C), being one of the best examples of the Neoclassical Revival Style in Vicksburg. The house is architecturally significant in the context of residential architecture in Vicksburg, Mississippi. It exhibits an outstanding design which represents the highlight of development during Vicksburg's boom period. The residence is one of only two remaining residences facing Cherry Street in the 1400, 1500, and 1600 blocks of Cherry Street which were lined with impressive residences at the turn of the century. Cherry Street was the most fashionable residential street in town in the 1890s (In and About Vicksburg, 1890). Please refer to the contextual statement for more information about the architecture of Vicksburg.

The house was built in 1902 by Theresa Blum, widow of Solomon Blum, a prosperous merchant from Delhi, Louisiana. In 1895 Blum was vice president of the Vicksburg Board of Trade and on the Board of Directors of First National Bank. The building is today maintained as a residence.
