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DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Corners is a one-and-a-half-story brick residence facing west from a terraced site overlooking the Mississippi River at Vicksburg. Enclosed by an original iron fence cast in Philadelphia, the lower grounds in front of the house are laid out into several parterres bordered by geometric brick walks. A brick paved service yard on the second terrace separates the rear of the house from the final, most elevated terrace. With few exceptions, the brick-lined gutters which drain the site are original.

Characterized by random, almost whimsical massing, conservative Greek Revival details and certain vernacular motifs, the design of The Corners is undoubtedly the product of an untrained, yet competent, architect. The dominant architectural feature is the raised gallery, which fronts the full width of the main block. Its rectangular columns are inlaid with decoratively sawn panels -- a popular Vicksburg idiom -and support a wide entablature with dentils and large, paired brackets. Producing an uncommon rhythm by reflecting the balanced yet asymmetrical fenestration of the main block, the first three bays of the gallery are noticeably wider than the remaining three bays. The gable roof complicates the facade further by not extending the full width of the elevation--the remainder being covered with a flat roof screened by a parapet treated as an entablature. The entrance is placed off-center and is marked by a Greek Revival frontispiece with pilasters, wide overhanging cornice, hinged sidelights, and transom. The single-leaf door has four hollow-corner panels with raised moldings. Flanking the entrance are full length, nine-over-nine windows capped by simple flat arches.

On the east, or rear, elevation, a recessed gallery is formed between two flat-roofed wings at the corners of the main block. The gallery's entablature is well proportioned but plain and is supported by heavy, paneled columns and pilasters. Instead of jack arches, decorative cast-iron lintels are used above the window openings on this and the remaining elevations. A long L-shaped service wing extends north and east from the residence and ends with an unrestored two-room servant quarters built at the level of the highest terrace. Because of its elevation, the quarters can only be reached from the exterior.

The plan of The Corners, an expansion and variation of the traditional double-pile formula, accommodates a large parlor, a passage, and bed and sitting rooms in the main block, and a library, a dining room, and kitchen, utility and bed rooms in three separate wings. In most rooms, the interior decoration is quite simple and usually limited to pilaster-like architraves, four-panel doors, and modern wooden cornices. As the "best-room," the parlor has more elaborate trim such as the full plaster entablature with a deeply undercut foliated frieze and the pair of heavy plaster centerpieces. A fine gilted centerpiece

in the dining room is composed of appropriately symbolic grapes, pears, and pineapples. Also in this room are cupboards with butterfly shelves flanking the fireplace.

Before it was purchased by the current owners in 1960, The Corners had been divided into apartments, an alteration that, fortunately, affected only the interior. To restore the interior, a partition dividing the parlors into two rooms was removed, the floors were patched and the entablature was repaired. Bathrooms were installed in former dressing rooms and the original kitchen was updated. The only adverse action taken during this rehabilitation occurred when the original arched, marble mantels were removed and replaced by ones of earlier designs. The most notable among these are the pair of Federal mantels in the parlor which were made in northern Delaware.

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STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Completed in 1873, The Corners is a highly individual architectural composition which includes elements of several styles. Although the fashionable Rococo Revival appears in some of the interior plaster decoration, the conservative Greek Revival vernacular style of Vicksburg predominates. The sawn inlays of the gallery are particularly characteristic, as are the interior door and window frames and the entrance frontispieces. The Corners is one of the largest, most ambitious, and best preserved residences in Vicksburg employing these local idioms. In addition to its architectural significance, the house enjoys a rare degree of landscape integrity: its walks, parterres, fences, and even the drainage system have survived intact.

The Corners was built by John A. Klein as a wedding gift to his daughter, Susan, who married Captain Isaac Bonham on May 7, 1873. Klein was a wealthy businessman who was described by one contemporary as having "a great passion for building" (<u>Vicksburg Evening Post</u>, February 4, 1884). His own neighboring residence, Cedar Grove, evolved by additions and remodellings that spanned a thirty-year period (ca. 1840-70), during which time he is thought to have been his own architect. Although no documentation has yet appeared, Klein is also believed to have designed The Corners, using the same basic plan and many of the same decorative elements found at Cedar Grove.

Bonham, a native of Virginia who served in General Turner Ashby's 7th Virginia Cavalry during the Civil War, was the cashier of a local ice company at the time of his marriage to Susan Klein. Within a few years he became a cotton factor and grocer in the firm of Halpin & Bonham, of which he was sole owner by 1882. The following year, at age thirty-six, Bonham was killed while attempting to quiet a barroom brawl (Vicksburg Evening Post, August 13, 1883). Bonham's widow continued to reside at The Corners until 1919, when the property was sold to Antoine Tonnar, a wealthy planter (Deed book 140:326). In four years the house was again sold and, until purchased by its current owners in 1960, served as an apartment house (Deed books 155:355, 356:357). Now completely rehabilitated, The Corners is once again a single-family dwelling which is opened regularly to the public.
