DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Wetherbee House is located in downtown Greenville on a flat, grass-covered corner lot defined by a picket fence. The house is positioned on the lot to allow a small front yard on Main Street, a narrow side yard separated from the side street by a row of large trees, and a large back yard crossed by hedges and brick walks. Across the back of the lot is a one-and-a-half-story brick structure known as the carriage house. Certainly, some of its symmetrically arranged and segmentally arched openings, now bricked up, are large enough to have admitted a carriage.

The house itself is a small, one-story frame and clapboard structure set on low brick piers and roofed with intersecting gables in a manner typical of American cottages of the late nineteenth century. The facade (northeast elevation) is like many of these cottages in its irregular juxtaposition of a forward-projecting ell and an adjoining verandah which extends to the southwest across the remainder of the facade. The front wall of the ell contains a pair of floor-length sash windows which once gave access to a small roofed balcony set below the present louvered opening in the gable of the ell. verandah shelters the entrance door, set next to the ell, and two sash windows. The large glass panel of the door surmounts two wooden panels outlined with heavy bolection moldings like those found in the central hall, the front room in the ell, and the room behind it. Recently installed cast-iron mantelpieces adorn the back-to-back fireplaces in these two "best" rooms. On the other side of the hall are three smaller rooms, two of them decorated with simpler woodwork of an earlier character. The third room, forming a rear ell, was enlarged and remodeled, probably around 1900. The space between it and the end of the onestory, board-and-batten service building is now enclosed. A latticed verandah extends along the side of the service building, turns to cross the back of the ell, and turns again to follow the side of the ell and terminate at the back door of the hall. The verandah may have continued across the back of the northwest rooms where there is now a simple enclosed space for baths, dating from the first half of the twentieth century.

Structural evidence indicates that the house originally consisted of the front portion of the hall and the three rooms to the southeast. The architectural character of the other portions of the house indicates that these major additions probably were made not long after the original construction. A lesser remodeling occurred in the early twentieth century. Since 1973, the house has been partially restored to its pre-1900 condition.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

As the single residence remaining on Greenville's primary downtown thoroughfare, the Wetherbee House is a rare example of the modest cottage type of domestic architecture common to this town in the post-Civil-War decades. It stands as a concrete reminder of the town's post-war reestablishment as a commercial center for the Delta region.


The land on which the house is located was purchased in 1873 by Hiram Wetherbee (Deed book D2:481), who was born in Boone County, Kentucky, in 1842. Wetherbee was living with his parents in Galconda, Illinois, at the time of his enlistment in the Union army during the Civil War. He served with Company E, 120th Regiment Illinois Infantry, which was at Greenville prior to taking part in siege operations against Vicksburg from May to July, 1863. In returning to Greenville after the war, Wetherbee joined many other mid-westerners who settled in Washington County, Mississippi, during the 1860s and 1870s. The property had been a part of Blantonia Plantation, out of which the new town of Greenville was carved after the original town five miles to the south was burned during the war. Establishing himself as a planter and a prominent hardware merchant, Wetherbee was typical of the post-Civil-War residents who, combining agricultural and mercantile interests, rebuilt Greenville and assured its place as a business center for the surrounding counties.

The residence remained in the Wetherbee family until December 27, 1973, when it was sold to the Council of Greenville Garden Clubs, Incorporated (Deed book 1300:156-57), for operation as a meeting place and house museum. The structure enjoyed substantial architectural integrity, and what few features had been altered are being restored to their original appearance by the current owners. The city of Greenville supports this preservation project by contributing to the maintenance of the house.


