DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Coffeeville Hotel is a rectangular, wood, frame two-story building with a recessed front portico (Photo 1). The hotel rests on a northwest-southeast, northeast-southwest axis with its northwesterly side fronting on the Illinois Central Railroad.

The building measures 51 feet 10 inches from front to back and is 70 feet 10 inches wide. The front of the hotel is characterized by a recessed front portico with closed rooms on either end on both the ground and upper floors. The portico measures 39 feet 10 inches by 9 feet. The lower floor is constructed of poured concrete while the upper floor (same dimensions) is made of 1- by 4-inch tongue and groove pine flooring. Four wooden framed columns (14 by 16 inches) support the upper floor and roof.

The northeast side, between the north and east corner, contains eight single-paned windows, four below and four above. The exterior window framing of all windows is of plain 1- by 6-inch pine boards. The sashes are of a commercial, standard design. The third lower window from the north corner replaced a side entrance where the interior hallway was remodeled in 1949.

The southwest exterior wall has four windows on the upper floor and five on the lower floor; all are single pane.

The rear of the house has also been altered; its L-shaped kitchen area and porch, which run the full length of the back of the hotel, were removed in 1954 (Photo 2): The effect of this remodeling is most apparent in the outside wall for approximately 30 feet from the south corner toward the east corner where the kitchen once stood. The lower back floor has three exterior doors and one window. The doors once supplied access to the kitchen, the outside, and the original porch. The window also once opened onto the porch.

The original foundation consisted of brick piers of commercial brick and standard construction techniques. Parts of the intervening spaces between the exterior piers were filled with cement blocks during the 1950's (Photo 3). The sills are 6.5- by 10-inch rough sawn pine timber. The floor joists are 2- by 12-inch rough sawn pine set on 24-inch centers. The corner joinings are of a simple butt type fastened by commercial nails. The exterior walls are of 1- by 6-inch finished pine boards, overlapped and fastened by commercial nails. The corners are finished with vertical 1- by 6-inch pine boards and a quarter round molding at the joining. The eaves are enclosed by simple boxing on all sides, but are in bad condition because of weathering. There are no gutters or downspouts.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE OF A CONTRACT OF A

The building meets the criteria for National Register eligibility because it is "associated with the events that have made a significant contribution to the broad pattern of our history." The importance of the railroad to the economic, social, and commercial history of Coffeeville is illustrated by this building, located a few yards from the Illinois Central depot. Activities which depended on the railroad and were centered at the hotel included the accommodation of travelers, the display and sale of goods by drummers, and the location of professional offices to serve both rural and town clients. For the Coffeeville community, the hotel served as the single most significant product of the railroad age. The impact of the automobile upon passenger rail service is also vividly illustrated by the decline of the hotel after World War II.

As an example of the architectural history of railroad hotels in Mississippi, the Coffeeville hotel is moderately significant. It was designed with a spacious double gallery for the enjoyment of its guests, and with a pair of pyramidal roofs which visually announce the building as an important place. The sheer size, the symmetrical composition, and the spacious plan are combined to produce an unexpectantly prominent building in Coffeeville.

The roofline is of hip joint construction sloping to all sides from the roof tree which extends from northeast to southwest across the central 40 feet of the building. The front corner rooms, which enclose the portico, have peaked roofs. The peak of each roof is covered by a spherical ornament. The roof over the portico is a simple shed type, sloping to the front. The roof is of galvanized tin, but it has been repaired with asphalt and asbestos roll roofing materials. The tops of the chimneys were removed below the roofline.

A description of the interior of the house will not be given as it is not a necessary factor in assessing the hotel's significance.
