The Leist A Site (22-Sh-520) qualifies for listing in the National Register of Historic Places under Criterion D. This site has yielded and may again yield additional information important in understanding the prehistory of the area. Specifically, it has considerable potential to further our knowledge of the Mississippi Alluvial Plain Marksville and Mississippian Periods (Morgan 1987). In Phillips' (1970) volume on the archaeology the site is referred to as "one of the finest magnitude." While materials from both the Woodland and Mississippian Periods have been recovered from the site, it is presently not possible to determine the cultural affiliation of the large platform mound and the small conical mound situated atop it. While large, platform mounds are generally thought to be Mississippian Period in origin, it is interesting to note that Phillips (1970:370-371) recorded Issaquena (Woodland) materials in his test pits A and B (cuts A and B) at some two meters below the present ground surface of the mound.

The Leist A Site provides an opportunity to evaluate both Woodland and Mississippian cultural processes operative in the formation of this rich archaeological site. The question of whether or not the large platform mound was constructed during the Middle Woodland can be answered by additional systematic archaeological investigations at the The presence of a rich, relatively thick Issaquena midden lens site. the site as noted by the 1988 eroding out of Mississippi Department of Archives and History team suggests valuable subsistence and perhaps settlement pattern (seasonal) data are present. This could greatly add to our understanding of the Issaquena phase as shell, bone, lithics, and Issaquena ceramics were recovered from the exposed midden. The potential for pit features is also present and if verified their contents may provide carbonized material for radiocarbon dating and subsistence studies.

The site is presently owned by the Mississippi Department of Archives and History thereby protecting the site from any immediate dangers. Little evidence of relic collectors' pot holes are present at this site and this may in part be due to the relative inaccessibility of the site.
