Describe present and historic physical appearance.

The Charles Beam House is located about seven miles south of McCall Creek and fronts northerly onto the Boque Chitto and Meadville Road near its intersection with the Upper Meadville and Summit Road. vernacular, one-and-a-half story, Greek Revival frame house is sheltered by a gabled roof and is flanked at each gable end by a single, exterior brick chimney, one of which has been rebuilt. The original chimney is buttressed at the base and topped with a molded cap with white frieze, a common chimney treatment in neighboring Amite County and the Carolinas. The three-bay facade is fronted by a full-width gallery, which is supported by wooden posts that were originally linked by a balustrade, now missing. The gallery is shaded by a later shed-roof extension that wraps around the gallery ends. The facade is finished in horizontal matched boards (seventeen inches wide) with an unusual, molded-panel wainscoting and wide baseboard. The windows of the facade have molded frames with unusual wave crest lentils and are filled with nine-oversix, double-hung sash. The center-bay doorway is filled with doubleleaf, molded, two-panel doors set beneath a molded wood panel and flanked by sidelights over an arrangement of two molded panels.

The interior of the house has a double-pile plan with central hallway that widens between the two, smaller rear rooms, a floor plan common to the Lower Mississippi Valley. The interior walls are finished in horizontal matched boards with a wide molded baseboard. Some of the board walls have been covered by modern wall paneling, a wall treatment easily reversed. The windows and doors have molded frames and the doors have four panels that are molded on only one side. The original, interior decorative scheme of bluish green walls with oak-grained doors is clearly evident where later paint poorly adhered. Only the front, two downstairs rooms had fireplaces, and the large, wooden mantel pieces each have a molded panel frieze.

A stairway located at the rear of the hallway provides access to the upper half story. Although the stairway itself is original, it has been relocated from the southern wall at the front of the hallway. The steep, single-flight stair now opens into a second-story room rather than the central hallway of the upper story. The upper story, which is otherwise unaltered, is plainly trimmed and finished in horizontal matched boards that have never been painted.

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Extending from the rear of the house is a one-story, two-room wing added about 1921. The wing is flanked by porches on both sides and contains a dining room and kitchen, both with beaded-board walls and original cabinets typical of the 1920's. Two historic outbuildings are located within the nominated seventeen acres. A small, log smoke house is located in the yard at the rear of the main house, and a large frame barn with gabled roof and side sheds is located southeasterly from the house outside the yard. The plantation cemetery, where C. W. Beam and his family are buried, is located across the road from the house but is outside the nominated acreage.

Alterations are limited principally to the addition of paneling over the horizontal board walls, the relocation of the original stairway, and the replacement of a gable-end window with a door and small porch on the western elevation. The present owner, who is descended from the Cowerts who acquired the house in 1909, is planning to restore the house.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

The Beam House is one of Mississippi's unique expressions of the vernacular Greek Revival style. Although typical of the dwellings built by middle class planters in rural areas of Mississippi in the midnineteenth century, the house is distinguished by unusual architectural details. The facade of the house is adorned with a molded panel wainscoting, whose panels are echoed in a single panel above the entrance doorway and in double panels beneath the sidelights. The use of molded panels as a decorative motif is also repreated on the friezes, brackets, and pilasters of the mantel pieces. Also unusual are the wave crest lintels of the front windows of the house. The overall integrity of the house is good, and its significance as a plantation dwelling is heightened by its integrity of setting and the survival of its original barn and smoke house.

The Beam House stylistically dates to the late 1850's and was built as the residence for Charles Walton Beam, who was born in 1819 and died in 1896 (Tombstone, Beam Cemetery, Franklin County, Mississippi). Beam, who was born in Middlesex County, Massachusetts, moved to Franklin County, Mississippi, about 1838, and, in 1868, served as a delegate from Franklin County to the Mississippi Constitutional Convention (W. W. Lambright, HISTORY OF FRANKLIN COUNTY, MISSISSIPPI, FROM 1809 TO 1899 [McComb, Mississippi: McComb Special Job Office Print, 1899], p. 90). The Beam family owned the house until the early 1900's, when it was purchased by Sam Allred, who subsequently sold the house in 1909 to Walter Cowart. The house is today owned by the grandson of Walter Cowart, who plans to restore the house as a vacation home. The Beam House will be the first residence in Franklin County to be listed in the National Register of Historic Places.




